What does accepting refugees really mean to us?

It can no longer be overlooked: The question of refugees has become a dominant topic in the media, though prior to this 50 million people worldwide were already on the run. However now, for the first time in many years, a new wave of refugees is reaching Europe. Whether this wave will extend to North America, is not yet known.

"Is Europe really undergoing a foreign invasion?" This is a question I find truly remarkable. At the end of August, the Slovakian government announced that they would only accept Christian refugees. The thinking is that these refugees will be easier to integrate and the risk of taking in Muslim and Islamic terrorists will be lower. There are people in Germany, too, with the opinion that the Christian West must be protected from a foreign invasion.

But what difference does it really make to the identity of a predominantly Christian country, whether it is Slovakia, Germany or Canada? Anyone who reads the Bible carefully will notice that refugee stories play an important role. Abraham goes to Egypt with his family as an economic refugee, Moses is on the run to the east and Paul is forced to flee more than once for political reasons. So it should come as no surprise that the oldest declaration of faith in the Bible talks about the experience of being foreign. Deut 26:5b states: "you shall make this response before the Lord your God: 'A wandering Aramean was my ancestor; he went down into Egypt and lived there as an alien...'" This experience has become deeply embedded in our collective memory and the protection of foreigners was therefore an important part of law in Israel. This tradition continues in the New Testament. Being pursued was a reality of many early Christian churches.

Therefore I think that those who believe Europe and North America were profoundly influenced by the Christian culture, should support the protection of strangers and refugees. This is why I'm happy that not only the borders, but also people's hearts and homes, are opening to those who are (still) strangers. For I believe that whoever welcomes strangers, offers them a home and protects them, is living a Christian identity. We will not lose our Christian identity if we take in foreigners, on the contrary: **We find and live it.**

This is why I hope and pray that the Syrian refugees we're sponsoring will arrive soon. May they and many others find a peaceful and safe home, and feel that they are welcome.

There are any number of examples throughout the Martin Luther Church history that follow the three steps of **dream**, **hope**, and **believe**. The women's group **believed** they could buy an organ—they made it happen. All MLC Pastors **believe** in the necessity of a Day Care—it happens. Council **believed** that change was necessary—the first (second and third) EKD Pastor came to Canada. People **believe** in the opening of the 5 Superior building—it will happen.

Report National Convention, Edmonton

by Pastor Christian Ceconi Early in the morning on July 9th I left home to attend the National Convention of the ELCIC in Edmonton. At Tim Horton's in the airport I met with Dean Ilze and Andrew, both member of our Area leadership team, to discuss some aspects of the bulletin of reports (still available online at elcic.ca) during the flight.

In Edmonton we were greeted by the welcoming team. Throughout the convention the hospitality of the Edmonton congregations was amazing. Around noon we all met in the Shaw conference center for an inspiring opening service in the conference hall. I strongly recommend watching the sermons of our National Bishop Susan Johnson, the Presiding Bishop of the ELCA Elizabeth Eaton and the Primate of the Anglican Church in Canada Fred Hiltz; all wonderful preachers.

What are the headlines from this year's National Convention?

- The Convention adopted the theme of the Lutheran World Federation (LWF) for the commemoration of the 500th anniversary of the Lutheran Reformation: "Liberated by God's Grace" along with the three sub-themes: Salvation—not for sale, Human Beings—not for sale, Creation—not for sale.
- To commemorate the anniversary the ELCIC will have a reformation challenge. Together we want to sponsor 500 refugees, provide 500 scholarships to Lutheran schools in the Holy Land, plant 500,000 trees and donate \$500,000 for the LWF Endowment Fund.

- The finances of the church are healthy, the 2015–17 budget for the National Church passed.
- To make structural renewal easier, changes to constitution and bylaws were made (available on ELCIC website). In the future the synods will send a certain number of delegates to the National Convention to enable participation from more congregations. Bishop Johnson said: "We must implement changes to bring back a system of fair and equitable representation. The proposed constitution and bylaw amendments will help us achieve this."
- To practice compassionate justice, the convention passed a "resolution on the doctrine of discovery" and also resolutions "on Criminal Justice and Corrections System in Canada", on "Climate Justice" and on "Welcoming the Stranger." If you want to learn more about some of these topics, please watch online the two guest speakers Marie Wilson, commissioner of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission, and Jennifer Henry, executive director of KAIROS.

For more details about this year's convention please take one of the Letters from the National Bishop and the Annual report which we provide in the church. Photos and reports are available on the ELCIC website (elcic.ca).

The closing service at Trinity, Edmonton (also a bilingual German English congregation), was the hottest service I have ever attended: 35°C, no AC and about 450 people in the church. We all went home sweaty, inspired, happy and proud to be members of such a vibrant and active church.

Theological Background

Seminar About Hymns by Vicar Moritz Menacher

Dear Congregation,

Most crops have already been harvested; some are still in the fields and orchards. The first bright colours are appearing in the trees. All these are signs of the approaching fall. For me, fall has not yet started, it begins with the Thanksgiving Service, which is celebrated in Germany the

first weekend in October. Fall begins when the congregation gathers and gives thanks for all God has given to us; when the congregation gives thanks to God in prayer and song. There is one song in particular which for me expresses the "Thanksgiving feeling" best: "We plow the fields and scatter the good seed on the land, but it is fed and watered by God's almighty hand." (ELW 681)

Matthias Claudius wrote the original in 1783 as part of a theater play. It quickly gained popularity as a folk

song and finally found its place in worship. In 1861, it was translated by Jane M. Campbell into the English language. She beautifully conveys the original spirit of Claudius' language as they talk in lucid and empathic images about God's work within nature. It has always touched me deeply how Claudius pictures the relation between our human work and God's creative power. As we see in verse one, we plow the fields, but it is God's almighty hand which brings forth the crops for harvest. With all our toil, we can never guarantee plentiful growth. It is God who gifts us with the fruits of our labour. Obviously we work hard to improve the conditions for growth, but in the end we depend on heaven above.

In the German original, Claudius depicts in the second verse how God sends his blessing down to earth, wrapped in thaw and rain, as well as sun and moonlight: "It passes through our hands, but it comes from God the Lord!" For me, this is one of the most beautiful ways to describe the way God's blessing comes to us and into our world. With our own hands we can share God's blessing! The work of our hands is part of God's work in our world! It is in and through our work that God is at work. At the same time, this image sheds a different light on our achievements. The refrain says: **"All good gifts around us are sent from heav'n above."** Whenever something good comes from our labour it is granted to us by God. It is never just our own but always God's doing which brings forth good. Thus, **"We thank you, Lord, we thank you,**

Lord, for all your love!"

I am glad that music plays such a huge role in the Lutheran tradition. We have an impressive and ever growing repertoire of church music. It is a fountain of inspiration for our worship services and our daily life. Martin Luther said, **"Music is a pure gift and a blessing from God. It drives out the devil, produces happy people and makes you forget all ill."**

For Luther, the text was as important as the melody itself, such that "you sing not only with words, but with sense and understanding of the heart." In our hymn books, we find a great variety of songs from many centuries. We find songs narrating biblical stories, songs praising and worshipping God, songs of lament and of adoration, songs which voice all the different feelings of our heart and mind. Every song in our hymn books has its own theological profile and individual intent, based on the faith of the authors and the contexts of their lives. I love to discover these profiles and intents to dwell on their images and reflect on their meaning. Surprisingly, I don't only discover new songs. Often the well-known open anew when I sing or hear them in a different context or study them in detail.

I really would like to share such moments with you and warmly invite you to our upcoming "Song Study." Linda Marcinkus and I have prepared five evenings to discover five centuries of church music. I am looking forward to exploring old and new lyrics and bringing melodies to life.
