A Story That Has Only Just Begun

At an international conference with other theologians I met a pastor from the Netherlands. As it turned out he was a member of the Brethren (Moravian Church), working on a thesis on religious biographies. Suddenly this entirely unspectacular subject got very interesting when he began to tell me about the background of the biographical reports and with whom he worked.

Older members of the Moravian Church were asked to write down their life story. Quite often this took place with the help of other parishioners. At the base of this practice lies the idea: If we believe that God is active in historical event, revealed in our human history, then it is important to look for the traces of his activity. Reflecting on a life story consequently becomes a search for God's traces in this life and the need to talk about them. The biographies were therefore not written for the sake of glorification or vanity. On the contrary, they were meant to speak about God's work as it was experienced by individuals, to honor God, to become indicators for the next generation and to discover how and where God can be experienced in this world.

Simply a wonderful way to tell a story without being nostalgic. To read the story as God's story, this is how I would like to look back on the anniversary of our congregation. A story that—has only just begun—at least in God's temporal dimensions. We've only just opened with the first chapters and the story will go on. The stories of the elderly are important milestones that aid in retrospect with the orientation for the future. Every Sunday we celebrate God's presence, that we are not traveling alone, but are accompanied and led by his Spirit. We are human beings on the way to God's future. A future that we do not need to create only by ourselves, but receive from his hands. From this let us draw courage, let us trust that God still has a lot in store for us. Let us celebrate that he deems us worthy to serve him and to actively spread his love in this world. With us he sets signs and will continue to do so. Yesterday, today and tomorrow!

We Will Bring the Peace Light to the Lakeshore

Each year, a child from Upper Austria fetches the light from the grotto in Bethlehem where Jesus was born. The light is carried in two blast proof miners lamps on an Austrian Airlines jet from Tel Aviv (Israel) to Vienna (Austria) from where it is distributed at a Service of Dedication to delegations from across Europe. They take it back, with a message of Peace, to their own countries. Austrian Airlines then flies the miner's lamps containing the Peace Light from Bethlehem to New York City from where it is distributed in North America. On December 6th it will arrive at the Christmas Market in Toronto's Distillery District and Martin Luther Church will bring it to the Lakeshore and pass it on during the Candlelight service on the 4th Sunday of Advent. Bring a

lantern to take it home and to bring the light of peace to all your friends.

Bishop Bedford-Strohm Reelected

Term of office until 2021. Heinrich Bedford-Strohm remains chair of EKD Council

Bremen, November 11, 2015 This morning, Heinrich Bedford-Strohm, bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Bavaria, received 124 of 125 votes cast by the Synod and Church Conference of the Evangelical Church in Germany (EKD), currently convening in Bremen. Congratulating him on his election, Synod president Irmgard Schwaetzer declared, "We are delighted about this outstanding result." Together with the members of the Council, Heinrich Bedford-Strohm would guarantee the presence of the church in contemporary societal debates, she added. "There is a growing need for ethical orientation," she underlined. "And the upcoming Reformation anniversary will also pose high demands on public communication by theologians and church leaders."

Bedford-Strohm (55), born in 1960 in Memmingen, Bavaria, has been bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Bavaria since the end of 2011 and a member of the EKD Council since November 2013. At the end of 2014 he followed Nikolaus Schneider as its chair. Having started out as a pastor in diaconal and congregational ministry, Bedford-Strohm then became professor for Systematic Theology and Contemporary Theological Issues at Bamberg University. Heinrich Bedford-Strohm is married and has three adult children.

About the EKD Synod: the EKD Synod, with the Council and Church Conference, is one of the three governing bodies of the EKD. It is convening from 8 to 11 November in Bremen. In accordance with the EKD's constitution, the 12th Synod has 120 members. The assignments of Synod include drafting declarations and decisions on contemporary questions and accompanying the work of the EKD Council by issuing guidelines. Synod also discusses and adopts the budget and church laws. Synod is chaired by a body of moderators (presidium), under its president Irmgard Schwaetzer. She is also a

member of the 15-person EKD Council to be elected in Bremen. Chair of the EKD Council is the Lutheran Bishop of Bavaria, Heinrich Bedford-Strohm. The EKD is a community of 20 Lutheran, Reformed and United regional churches in Germany. 23 million Protestants belong to one of the 15,000 congregations.

The Pope Visits The Evangelical Lutheran Church in Rome

Rome Pope Francis has indicated the possibility to freely make a conscious decision in regards to joint Communion celebrations for Catholics and Lutherans. Life is "greater than interpretations," he said on November 15th during a visit to the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Christ in Rome in light of the difference in understanding the sacrament of Catholics and Lutherans. Both share the same baptism. Everyone needs to find an answer for themselves.

"I would not dare declare it, because that is not in my competence," said the head of the Catholic Church. The faithful should speak to God and move forward. "That's all I venture to say," added the Pope.

Francis is the third pope who visited the hundred-year-old Lutheran church in the city of Rome. Prior to this his two predecessors, John Paul II. and Benedict XVI., accepted an invitation from the Lutheran minority church.

New Dean Appointed for Our Central Toronto Ministry Area

In October 2015, Rev. Ilze Kupleans-Ewart resigned as Dean of the Central Toronto Ministry Area. We are very thankful for her good leadership and for serving our Lutheran community in the initial year of the new area structure.

In November Bishop Dr. Michael Pryse appointed our Pastor Christian Ceconi as the new Dean of our area.

The Reformation on the One World

by Hanna Reichel In the common form of the Apostles' Creed, we confess one „holy Catholic church.“ Did that ever catch your attention? Have you ever reacted by thinking: „But I am Lutheran, am I not?“ At Martin Luther Church, it reads: „holy Christian church.“ What may sound like something quite different actually points to the same thing.

The Greek word „catholos“ originally means: „universal.“ From early on, Christians saw the church as the earthly body of Jesus Christ. Thus, they believed that the great variety of local congregations was an expression of something more: a truly universal community, founded in Jesus Christ, where all divisions of nation, class, gender and even religion were to be overcome. When we confess the „holy catholic church,“ this is a reminder that beyond all differences of tradition, language, culture, liturgy, confession etc, the Church is *one* because it is founded in the sending of Jesus Christ and the spirit into the *one* world of our *one* God.

On October 31st—which is not only Halloween, but also Reformation day—a new theme was inaugurated for the coming year: „The Reformation and the One World.“ The Reformation was a movement of renewal and transformation of the one Church. However, it resulted in lasting divisions, led to mutual accusations, sectarian strife and wars. Despite the manifold accomplishments of the Reformation, of which we rightfully are proud: The fact that even today we have separate denominations without full communion can be seen as a failure of the Reformation movement, rather than as its achievement. It reminds us that we still need to continue reflecting on and reforming our understanding of what it means to be part of the one Church of Jesus Christ.

From the beginning, the Reformation itself was a pluralistic movement of international scope. Martin Luther was an important one among its many distinct voices. The Reformation was also a starting point for the diversification of the Church. The bible was translated into new languages and read by common people, worship and church organization became more participatory, education and emancipation was propagated, enumerable works of music and fine arts created. In the wake of the Reformation, different expressions of faith, various styles of worship and congregational life, an abundance

of media and cultural resources came to bear witness to the one God. The ensuing diversity is a rich and plentiful, a many-voiced choir for the glory of God and something we as humans also can enjoy.

Not only did the Reformation movement greatly contribute to this pluralisation of the Christian witness but also to the globalization of the one world. From the very beginning, the Reformation went out into the world. Religious refugees and ardent missionaries migrated across the globe in search for freedom or in the enthusiastic proclamation of the gospel. They brought into contact different cultures, societies and customs. As they went, they themselves diversified as well as enriched many a society. Some even became the founding fathers of new, democratic nations. They also paved the ambivalent roads to globalization as well as to imperialism and colonialism. Which responsibilities for the future of our one world do we inherit from this history? Solidarity with refugees, dialogue with other cultures, denominations and religions, the healing of colonial wounds, commitment to justice and peace, tolerance and diversity may not just be optional here.

Today, we live in a „global world.“ But is it really „one world“? John Calvin, another of the great Reformation thinkers, once said about the Church: Holding on to its oneness is actually the strongest criticism one can voice against its current state of affairs. If we today confess the „holy catholic Church,“ this is a powerful objection to any denominational strife dividing the one Church of Christ as well as to the vast injustices and conflicts dividing the one world of God. This confession entails a commitment. *Ecclesia semper reformanda—the Church always has to be reformed* was an important insight of the Reformation: We have to hold on to the „reformation“ of Church and world as a stance and as a movement rather than as a result and an identity. What shape could such a movement take today?
