50 Days of Joy and Reconciliation

"The Lord is risen!—He is risen indeed!" These reassuring words accompany us between Easter and Pentecost beginning with Easter morning. 50 days dedicated to the joyous events of Easter. But how do you actually take the joy of Easter into your daily life? One key is reconciliation. In other words: The confidence that relationships can heal and that not all disagreements and ruptures in life are final. Easter lifts the finality, despite our conviction that it's all over. Easter surprises, even when people are certain that there is no turning back anymore.

The apostle Paul is excited about this phenomenon and writes to his friends in Corinth:

In Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting the message of reconciliation to us. So we are ambassadors for Christ, since God is making his appeal through us; we entreat you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God. (2 Cor 5:19-20)

Reconciliation needs will power and courage on both sides, for the person in need of forgiveness and the one granting forgiveness. Both have to jump over their own shadows, the shadows of hopelessness which binds us into believing that nothing makes a difference anymore. Reconciliation in everyday life means, not to give up on broken relationships but to make room for hope.

From Jesus we can learn, that hope has a good chance when one of the parties dares to take the first step in order to initiate reconciliation. This is certainly what God conveyed. In Christ he has practically granted forgiveness in advance. He prepared a path of hope without assurance that all will accept it. He breaks with the traditional human pattern which is quite often: But you have to make the first move! Even children play like that. As children of God, Jesus encourages us to discard this old pattern and to leave it behind.

For God, reconciliation and healing is so important that he passes through death, so that we have hope and find the courage to live in reconciliation.

The 50 joyous days between Easter and Pentecost are probably way too short to let this message penetrate through our entire life. They are surely a humble beginning and a good opportunity. Take courage and have hope to get on your way as ambassadors of God's reconciliation. It will do you, and the people you encounter a world of good.

Now it is soon time to say goodbye. Therefore we invite you for snacks and chats after the Pentecost service at 11:00 am.


On behalf of the whole congregation, a big thank you already in advance to Moritz and his family.

News from ELCIC, EKD and DELKINA

Our Congregation is a member of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada (ELCIC) and the Eastern Synod. We are partnered with the Evangelical Church in Germany (EKD) and member of the Deutsche Evangelisch-lutherische Konferenz in Nordamerika (DELKINA)

EKD Seminar in February 2016

To summarize: What would you like to hear first? The good news or the good news?

53 church council members from 46 German churches on five continents traveled for three days to Hanover to get excited about being Lutheran. The whole Saturday was spent learning about all the events planned for the Reformation anniversary in 2017. Museums in North America open their doors to display Reformation artifacts (providing enough online material for churches to create their own little museum experience), films about the Reformation are in the making, in Europe a huge trailer spreads the Reformation message from May until September from city to city to end its months long trek in Wittenberg and there, you might like to spend 6 days at the EKD Tent of Welcome to meet members of EKD churches

and greet visitors from all over the world. 90% of the cost for the trip are covered. If you, your friends and family are interested, please talk to Iris.

Another way to profit from the excellent projects run and sponsored by the EKD is the lay preacher seminar from the 2nd – 5th of February 2017, followed by the church council seminar just a week later.

Expats: In the seminar it was mentioned that Germans temporarily living abroad can donate to the church in the country they are residing in and reclaim this donation from church taxes paid in Germany. An official letter from the EKD with the outlined procedure is expected shortly.

Needless to say, it was an excellent trip. Thank you to the MLC and the EKD for the opportunity to learn.

Theological Background

Lutheran Worship in Germany and North-America

„Dear friends, let us bless this house and consecrate it to our Lord Jesus Christ, [...] so that there is nothing else happening in here, than that our Lord speaks to us through his sacred word and that we speak with him through prayer and praise.” Martin Luther spoke these words when he consecrated the church of the castle in Torgau and defined his understanding in one sentence. This structure—God speaks to us through his word and we speak to him through our prayers—is typical for a worship service for millennia. When celebrating worship, we not only begin a conversation with God, but remember the history Christianity had with God and our Jewish heritage. The psalms and readings from the Old Testament are elements of worship Jesus himself celebrated in the temple in Jerusalem and in the synagogues in the countryside. The readings from the New Testament bring the life and teaching of Jesus to the congregation. The sermon as interpretation of the Holy Scripture is something Jesus himself did in the synagogues in his time. The unique elements of Christian worship are the celebration of Holy Communion and the Lord’s Prayer,

elements which connect us with Jesus in a special way.

Martin Luther’s definition of worship as conversation is found in the liturgical setting of worship itself: greeting, exchange of information through the Prayer of the Day, the readings and the sermon, sometimes having a meal together, and then the good-bye with sending and blessing. All this accompanied by music and singing.

During the centuries the worship became more ritualized, so that a Christian from Jerusalem could celebrate the same worship in Rome as he did back home. With Christianity becoming the major religion with millions of believers, Christianity split into regional churches and worship diversified with regional traditions. We can encounter this nowadays when we take part in the worship services of different Christian denominations: the Lutheran worship is different than for instance the Catholic or the Presbyterian.

But there are regional differences in the denominations as well. When looking at the Lutheran worship in Germany and in North-America, we see differences in the liturgy and in the music. Using different music is due to the different languages and also to the different development of music in North-America and Germany. The Lutheran

church follows herein Luther's demand to "look at the crowd's mouth" and use the everyday language and music in worship. The differences in the liturgy have a different background: In Germany the evangelical churches of the Lutheran and Reformed traditions began to develop a common worship setting with elements of both traditions and in opposition to the Catholic worship service. This led to the common guidelines for evangelical service introduced on the First of Advent 1999. In North-America meanwhile, the Lutheran church found its identity marker in being THE liturgical protestant church with a sung liturgy and elaborate worship elements.

Our Martin-Luther-Church is a church where the German and the North-American Lutheran traditions meet and invigorate each other. As of now, we still use a German liturgy in the English Service, so the Worship-Team, working together with the Church Council, suggested to try out a North-American liturgy for a couple of months, beginning on the 8th of May. If you are interested you can check Setting Ten in the Evangelical Lutheran Worship on page 203.
