A Good Read for the Summer Holidays

Ever thought about what to read during your summer holidays? Here is my recommendation: Take a Bible with you, preferably a more modern translation, for example the New International Version (NIV)—or just the one you have available. Usually we read bits and pieces, like the lectionary on Sunday, a daily devotional or the watchword. But the Bible was written when people loved to tell stories and when storytelling was a common practice. Remember, they had no smart phones, TV or Netflix at this time. So reading an



entire Gospel or reading the entire book of Job is an exciting endeavor. You will discover new links and interrelationships and at the end you will understand the big picture much better. Just take the Bible as a book. And since it's actually a collection of various books and stories you could also cruise around and flip back and forth (that's also something I appreciate when reading during my holidays).

No idea what to start with? Here are my recommendations for your holidays based on time and interest:

- You have only 5 minutes, but you want to gain practical wisdom? Take a look at the book of Proverbs. That's where you find a huge collection of proverbs, sayings and wisdom. Since it's a collection you could practically start anywhere in this book and read as long as you like. My favorites are: Proverbs 16:32
- You are a pastor and you like to laugh? There is a weird story in the book of Acts telling what happens when you preach too long. You will learn: listening to a sermon might be damaging to your health! See Acts 20:7–12.
- You like action movies and related stories? Take a look at the book of Judges from the Old Testament. (Not recommended for children under 16!): Judges 4:1-24
- You are in love? Read to your beloved from the Song of Songs. It's a love story, interpreted as a love story between Israel and God, but also featuring how wonderful it is to be in love with your true love.
- You have two hours? Read the Gospel of Mark as a whole. That's what this book was made for: To give you a quick introduction to what the Gospel of Jesus is about. And I am sure: You will spend another two hours with the Gospel of Luke, to compare how he tells the story.

Enjoy your holidays by reading the Holy Scriptures once in a while!

This year we host fantastic choirs from Germany that will enrich our congregational life with concerts, worship services and a large Gospel Music Workshop. Take advantage of this unique opportunity and enjoy modern church music at its best:

• Saturday August 29, 5 pm: Gospel Concert at our church by St. Martin Gospel Choir from Nienburg, Germany. We can expect a varied program under the direction of church musician lmke Marks: African hymns, traditional gospel and spiritual songs, as well as modern church songs. The Newly Installed Building Committee

You may have heard of our Building Committee. What is it and why do we need it? The task of the Building Committee is not, as its name might suggest, the construction of a new church or repairs, but the development of a sustainable concept for our buildings and property (church and 5 Superior). Questions about purposes, standards, future users and user requirements, impact of the urban development plan Mimico 2020, as well as necessary financial efforts will be addressed. A first rough draft will be presented to the Council this fall.

The Committee will not undertake any construction work. It will only present a concept. It is solely up to the council to decide on any changes.

The vision statement of the Committee is: "We want to use our buildings to share our faith and serve our neighbours, reflecting the current and future needs of our congregation and community and meeting the most current environmental standards.

In this way, we will become a more welcoming congregation for all generations, both within our church family and in Christian outreach to the surrounding community."

In keeping with this statement, the Committee does not go over the head of the congregation. The ideas and needs of the current users—that is each one of you—will be incorporated into the concept. Therefore, Committee members interviewed representatives of

the main user groups in March. In June, new door bells were installed to improve communication with the office and building access.

Stonegate Ministry

Stonegate Ministry has served needy families in South East Etobicoke for 22 years and has a dedicated team of volunteers, staff, and a supportive church community. The



varied programs Stonegate Ministry offered in the past have been instrumental in helping people find practical, emotional and spiritual help. However it cannot operate from the Stonegate community in the near term because of a condo development.

The Lake Shore neighbourhood west of Park Lawn was identified as a community with similar needs to Stonegate and "Great Finds," a second hand store at 2358 Lake Shore Blvd, opened in 2014. A growing frustration has been their inability to offer a full slate of programs due to the lack of suitable premises. Pastor Christian, President Iris and WMUC Pastor Paul met with Stonegate Ministry staff in May and the discussion about partnering with them continued with Council in June to understand how they may again offer a wide range of programs.

Theological Background

Interviewing Vicar Moritz Menacher


Our new Vicar Moritz Menacher came over from Germany to work for one year in our congregation. He graduated with a bachelor in Molecular Biotechnology and a master in theology from the University in Heidelberg. He completed his education to become a pastor with a 2.5 years internship at Vicelin-Schalom congregation in Norderstedt (north of Hamburg) and the seminary of the Evangelical-Lutheran Church in Northern Germany (Nordkirche) in Ratzeburg. In this issue of our newsletter we take the opportunity to ask him about what's new in theology and about his theological background.

Q: Moritz, looking at your resume we were surprised that you first studied molecular biotechnology? What's molecular biotechnology about and is there any connection to theology?

A: Molecular biotechnology as a science focuses on the molecular and cellular mechanisms in the body. Its aim is it to achieve more knowledge on how the biochemical and molecular mechanisms of the body work and how genetic defects afflict the body. Therefore three major fields structure the studies: **1. Drug Development Research** focusing on methods and mechanisms for the designing of new drugs, **2. Biophysics** focusing on cell-to-cell interaction and signaling and **3. Bioinformatics** focusing on information technology as a research tool for data analysis and coding of tools for your own research projects.

Well, are there any connections to theology? In short: No, with a 'but.' At the department of Theology I was working as research assistant at the chair of ethics and we did courses on bioethics for students of molecular biotechnology.

Q: Can you pinpoint when you decided to study theology? **A:** Definitely. In my final year as a bachelor student when I was working with human cells I started wondering about the ethical issues of this particular cell line we were working on. You see, since the 1970s there is one cell line called HeLa which is nowadays used in nearly every



lab. This cell line was cultivated from cervix carcinoma tissue from a woman who died of this cancer and she was never asked or could give informed consent to use her body material in clinical research. That made me start to wonder and I got more and more interested in bioethical issues and then decided to take classes in bioethics at the department of theology and then I got hooked. I enjoyed theology more and more and then, without really noticing I was on my way to becoming a pastor.

Q: The University of Heidelberg is one of the oldest in Europe (founded in 1386). What did you like most about this place?

A: I think what I like most about the University of Heidelberg is the combination of tradition, history and modernity. On the one hand you find traces of that history everywhere: like old buildings or name plates mentioning famous researchers; on the other hand you know, feel and see that you are in one of the best universities with cutting edge research and a vision for the future. And as a Lutheran theologian there is always the knowledge that Martin Luther himself was in Heidelberg in 1518 to defend his ideas.

Q: You just finished your internship which takes about 2.5 years in the Nordkirche. What was your best moment during these years? What did you like most about being a Vikar (Pastor in training)?

A: There were actually two moments I enjoyed most. The first was when I could finally lift my gaze from my script during a sermon and saw for the first time that people actually listened to what I said. It was such a surprise that I lost track and had difficulties remembering what I said last. And the second moment was in winter when there was a storm in northern Germany and all public transportation was shut down and all the schools were closed. But I had my practical pedagogical exam in teaching confirmation classes that day and I was wondering if any students would come. And they came through wind and rain, brought by their parents, so that I could have my exam that day.

Q: Assuming that young Pastors are always dynamic and full of ideas: When you imagine the Lutheran church in 2030, what would it look like (best case scenario)? **A:** When I think of a modern church I actually think of a very old one: the congregations founded by Paul. I am

always fascinated how different and dynamic they were and how modern. Especially that people of all classes and sexes found a place to be there and participate in the congregation. At that time being a Christian meant being part of a minority and your decision to leave the old ways and base your life on Jesus was always criticized by the surrounding society. So, strong faith was needed to just live as a Christian. And that faith and the communication with other congregations and of course Paul held the early church together in a fascinating way. The first Christians cared for one another and their brothers and sisters far away and helped.

So, my Lutheran church of 2030 would be a global church held together by faith and communication. It would be a place for all to be themselves and where people care for one another here and around the world. It would be a church who knows her traditions and honours them, but is not afraid to adapt to the world of tomorrow.
