What if the kids know better?

Do you ever think about our ways of being church, for example our liturgy? Do you ever think about how it might appear to someone who's not familiar with church at all? As I grew up in churches, I will never know how that feels. But I ask myself the question: Do we respond to the questions and needs those people have and bring? Is our church actually a place for everyone? In Mark 7:24-37 we learn about a person who's not close to Jesus and the Jewish faith. We learn about the Syrophenician Woman whose daughter was sick. When she heard about Jesus coming to town, she immediately went to see him and asked him to cast the demon out of her daughter. "He said to her, "Let the children be fed first, for it is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the dogs." But she answered him, "Sir, even the dogs under the table eat the children's crumbs." Then he said to her, "For saying that, you may go—the demon has left your daughter."

There's really only one thing we learn about the woman. She's a gentile. She's not a Jew. But she's so much more. She's a human being, she is a mother. She is so much more than just her origin. Jesus' exclusive answer didn't seem to surprise her. She probably already had the feeling that Jesus' healing power was only for the chosen people and not for everyone. I can't imagine how much it must have taken her to ask him, knowing that she wasn't one of the "children". But she didn't just accept it. She started to argue with Jesus. And this is what finally made him change his mind.

It seems to me that she didn't achieve this because she was especially clever but because she was more childish than other Israelite "children" that the gospel tells stories about. She knew she needed healing for her daughter and she knew that Jesus was able to do just that. For me, she seems as unconcerned as kids are when she encountered Jesus. Just as kids wouldn't see any difference in someone who is "churchy" and someone who is not, she asked for something that 'grown ups' would tell her she couldn't get.

In general, I think, there are quite a few things in churches that tell newcomers that what's offered is not meant for them. They are supposed to be 'liturgy-grown ups' and often times, there is no place for 'liturgy-children'. But what if we could make the same shift of mind as Jesus did? We could acknowledge that it's actually not the 'liturgy-grown ups', but the 'liturgy-children', who know what it's all about. We could acknowledge that they actually might have a better sense of what makes this faith honest and true and meaningful. I am sure we would create a world where the woman wouldn't have to describe herself as a dog and beg for the benefits of following Jesus, but where she would be invited to be part of the disciples in the first place. How exciting would that be?

As much as I value and appreciate our beautiful Sunday services, and as much as I encourage you to renew your effort to invite family members, strangers, and friends to share the enjoyment found in sermon and songs, I know that for many the writing (to regularly attend Sunday Services) has been on the wall for almost 30 years.

Mid-week Test

The need to work on a Sunday is, I know, only one of the various reasons for fewer people in the pews, but it surely helps to understand why new forms of worship are tried out, then added into our repertoire – one of which is our "Dinner Church" on the first Wednesday of the month. It is a wonderful way to learn about Jesus and to reach people by nourishing body, mind, and soul. Dinner Church provides wonderful opportunities for lay-leaders to fish in Jesus' Name. Also, the net was cast last newsletter for volunteers to help with a Neighborhood Women's Group, starting in September and meeting three times a month on Wednesday over lunch. We already have commitments from three of the five helpers envisioned for this new group.

Adding Zest

Being a fisherman is very much a mid-week activity, and a meeting of any of our many church groups is often the only time a participant steps into our church during the week. To ensure that each person receives spiritual nourishment, our round table meetings will focus more on the training of all group leaders to be confident in prayer to nourish each member of the group. In this way, we aim to give our volunteers the tools to fish, for once you know how to fish, you want to fish again.

Even so, fishermen cannot do their work alone especially during the dry summer months. Dinner Church by the Lake, June 5

This year we are inviting local organizations to share their experience of community and hardship in the Lakeshore area based on the work they do. We will reflect on how their work inspires our faith and then guide a discussion.



The following reflections by some Dinner Church participants detail how past Guest Speakers from Women's Habitat and Lakeshore Lodge have inspired them:

Andrea: Living in poverty has become the harsh reality for many women and their dependents in our Lakeshore community, especially for survivors of violence. In April, Carla Neto and Lina Almanzan from Women's Habitat spoke about their work at the shelter and outreach centre. Jocelyn: It was great to have guest speakers from Women's Habitat talk about their work supporting women through, for example, drop-in programs, one-on-one counselling, and housing. They really hit home with the severity of the current housing crisis, emphasizing how difficult it is for women to find a place of their own, and stating that their shelter is always full. They also shared how they are trying to prevent these situations through education, by teaching respect to the younger generation. It was also helpful to learn about ways in which MLC could help their cause, such as through fundraising and donating supplies. Dinner Church provided a warm and welcoming space in which to learn more about this organization and build new connections.

Marlena: Our Pastor and Vicar lead worship at Lakeshore Lodge Long-Term Care Home on Sundays every couple of months as part of regular ecumenical Christian services. In May we had the chance to listen to Rev. John Kim, Coordinator Spiritual & Religious Care at Lakeshore Lodge. He shared his background in hospital chaplaincy and congregational ministry and how he helps

people find meaning and purpose in life and builds trusting relationships by listening and mirroring. He deals with tough realities like seniors who need to move out of their home and loneliness. We were encouraged by the work of volunteers at Lakeshore Lodge. Rev. Kim shared, "It was an eye-opening experience for me as you are incorporating worship service into koinonia (fellowship) that appears to be a replica of early church practice."
