Relatable Faith!

Dear congregation!

"What is it that holds the world together at its core?" is what Goethe's Faust wished to discover in his famous monologue after much study and effort, and yet he found no satisfactory answer. What do you think?

Is it our thoughts, ideas or atoms with their electrons, protons, neutrons and quarks that span space and time for us? Or is it the network of data, of bits and bytes, which increasingly determines our everyday life?

With different "glasses" we look into the universe and it is difficult to find the answer.



"May God give you heaven's dew and earth's richness - an abundance of grain and new wine." (Genesis 27,28) These words from the First Testament answers the question from the perspective of faith. Isaac thus blesses his son Jacob and officially makes him his heir. He wishes all kinds of good things. The dew of Heaven. And fat from the earth. And grain. And wine in abundance.

What a wonderful wish!

There is something joyful in the words of Isaac! Being full in body and soul! No bored shrugging of shoulders. But fullness of life, given by God and brought forth by man's cooperation. Sowing and ripening; growing and harvesting; pressing and fermenting. A healthy rhythm of work and rest, of receiving and giving, of everyday life and celebration. Of freedom and moderation. It derives from an open view of the world and trust in God at the same time. A joyful testimony of life and faith. This is what according to the Bible holds the world and us together: Relationship.

Where we live in relationships, we inevitably become guilty of each other, have different needs that collide. My wish, for all of us this Autumn, is this: May we reap something of what we have sown, feel connected with each other, even across great distances and - with God's help - find ways of reconciliation after a quarrel or an injury. And that in all our efforts as his Church on the Lakeshore, we may feel the dew of Heaven falling, refreshing and invigorating us, entirely without our doing.

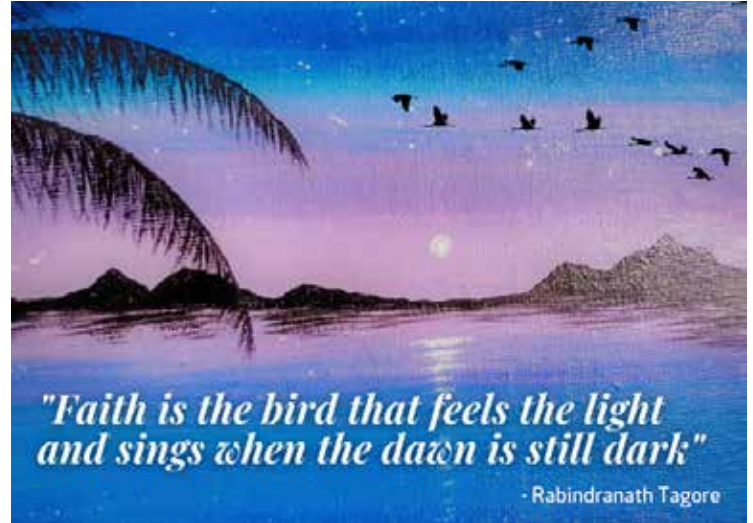

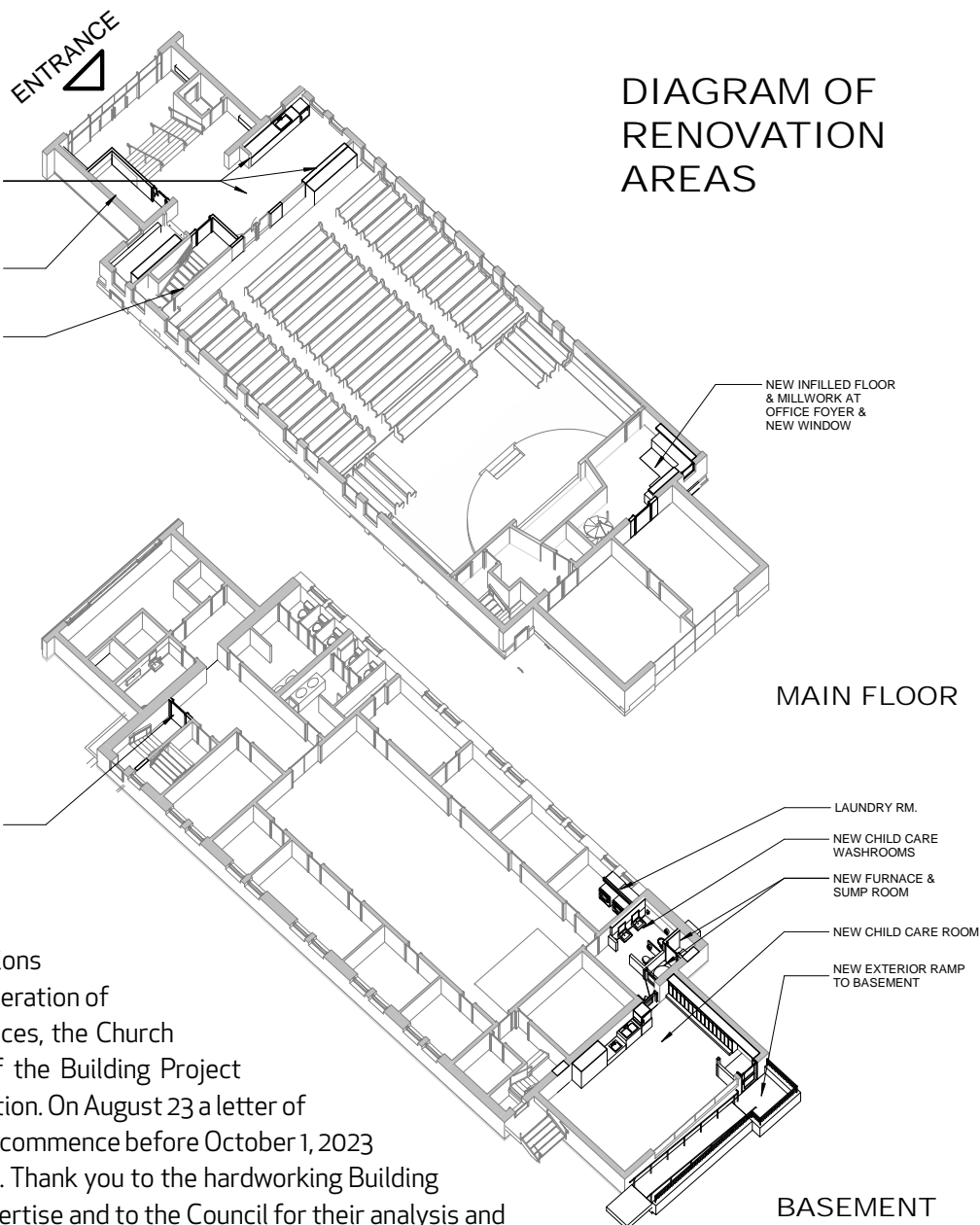

Renovation project update

Last November, a Town Hall meeting was held to vote on the scope of the church renovation, and it was confirmed that a new Child Care program room in the basement and improvements to the foyer would be made. The aim of the project was to aid the church mission to serve the community, increase our rental income and opportunities for partnerships, as well as create more flexible meeting space for church programs during the week. After almost a year of further design and engineering investigations, a final drawing set was issued to three contractors for bids. Although the bids were higher than anticipated, some miracle funding sourced from the City of Toronto by the Martin Luther Child Care made it possible to fund the project without requiring additional donations from the congregation. With careful consideration of the future of the church and current finances, the Church Council voted on the recommendation of the Building Project Committee to move forward with construction. On August 23 a letter of intent was sent to the contractor; work will commence before October 1, 2023 and is intended to continue into the spring. Thank you to the hardworking Building Project Committee for their effort and expertise and to the Council for their analysis and leadership in getting this long-awaited project to the construction phase. We pray for smooth sailing through this next chapter and have faith that the renovation will help our church to carry out its mission now and into the future! More information will be shared when scheduling details

become available.

The deadline for expressing interest is **October 15, 2023**. It is our hope that work on this piece will begin in the spring of 2024 and be completed by the end of the year.

Financial update

Over the course of the past year, it has become increasingly clear that our church's current funding model needs to change in light of our membership structure. Therefore, this summer the church board formed a new committee to work on finding ways to financially sustain Martin Luther Church. Among other things, we are currently addressing the following questions: How can we optimize the rentability of the church building after the upcoming renovations? How can we build up a reserve fund? At the moment this group, led by our president Mona Frantzke, is getting an overview of our situation. Important documents and information about the church and its buildings are being reviewed. We are contacting successful churches in our area and consulting with the Eastern Synod in regards to optimizing our governance structure and insurance. Members of the committee are currently Mona Frantzke, Martin Häfele, Kai Herrmann, Katja Brittain, Monika Schmidt, Stefan Sohns, and Vern Kakoschke. We welcome additional members who have expertise in building, finance, business and law.

Reflections

Return of our Lay Preachers Tanya Zielke and Katja Brittain

Dear Congregation,

After 366 days of travel around the world, I am finally home (well, until the next trip!). Over the last year I visited 34 countries, went on 17 tours, took 15 flights, met 136 fellow travellers and visited 8 EKD congregations. I visited Athens, Istanbul, Jerusalem, Cairo, Mexico, Pretoria, Swakopmund and Brussels. Each congregation welcomed me warmly and I had the opportunity to meet other German-speaking congregation members. Many aspects of the services were similar to our German service, as were the hymns. I absolutely enjoyed visiting German churches in other countries.

Not only did I visit EKD congregations, I also visited with former MLC Pastors and Vicars. I visited Stefan Wolf (and family), Alexander and Heike Mielke (and family) and of course, Christian Ceconi (and family). I also saw Kati Prosenjak, Thara Klein, Mirjam Steinebach, Silke Fahl and Caroline Raddatz. It was lovely celebrating services and catching-up with former MLC Pastors/Vicars.

I am already looking forward to sharing my adventures with the Congregation. Stay tuned for more information on those presentations!

Thank you to MLC for welcoming me back!

My husband, Chris and I spent the past 13 months in Germany, as he had an academic sabbatical year. Our base was in Berlin. I was able to reduce my full-time work in Canada to a few hours per week. I also found employment in Germany for six months to fulfil the required months necessary for the minimum pension in Germany.

We didn't set ourselves too many objectives for the year, but one was to attend one cultural event per week, be it a concert, museum, theatre, etc. Also, we sought to attend a Sunday church service in as many places as possible. We were able to witness examples of great ministries and church growth but also declining membership numbers - if anything, we can be assured that here in Canada, we all face very similar issues.

Such a great mixture of different experiences made it such a rich year. On another note, being Germany was very good for us to be with my aging, ailing mom and to engage with my brothers about the situation.

Returning to our old lives involves a culture shock, as much as our start in Berlin had been. Overall, it was a great opportunity to realise that the grass is not always greener on the other side. But, we were able to fine-tune our vision for what we want to do until the next sabbatical.

Regarding Sabbatical years, for example, in Leviticus 25:4 we read that after seven years, one is to rest with work on the fields. We didn't quite rest as such but our work here rested, and the change of context helps us return to our work in Canada with a refreshed perspective.

Farewell and godspeed to Christine Couturier!

Almost 20-years ago I crossed the border into Canada with my French-Canadian husband. We landed at Marina del Rey (an amenable location for a retired professional yacht captain) as I endeavoured to establish myself professionally in Toronto.

In selecting our rental condo, I had also noted the proximity to Martin Luther Ev. Lutheran Church. When I attended the first time



I was welcomed by Pastor Wolf from the pulpit, but then embarrassed when he suggested perhaps I was "a professional singer" (which I've never been.) Then this lovely woman approached me and said I should join the Christmas caroling that was being planned at Marina del Rey. That is when Ollie and I discovered that in addition to sharing Lutherans roots, we were living just floors apart! Many of you know that our lives became intricately intertwined, and that I had the privilege of accompanying her into the final stages of life.

Ollie also accompanied me in key moments of my life: the end of my first marriage; a period of uncertainty of what the future might hold; and the unanticipated joy of meeting a new mate (whom she also grew to love.) Robert and I often laughed when she insisted that she be our "Flower Girl" should we marry. We did, and she was.

Belonging to MLC helped "ground" me in Toronto. I believe I also related well to the Pastors assigned from Germany, and to the challenges their families faced. My own experience as an MK (Missionaries' Kid) in Argentina allowed me to understand the complexities of their lives away from their "Heimatland".

The opportunity that was afforded me to use my (non-professional) vocal training at MLC was especially gratifying, as there had been a hiatus of my avocation for 20 years while I pursued my corporate career in International Management. And while to some my membership may have seemed a bit "itinerant" at times, I see the gift of music and the compassionate care for a "Pillar of the Congregation" as my legacy to the MLC Church Family.

EKD Conference in Washington in April



From April 18-21, I was in Washington at the regional conference of the EKD together with the pastors of the congregations from North, Central and South America. I carpoled together with my colleague Judith Kierschke to save emissions and to see something of the country and its people. On the way there we stayed overnight in Pittsburgh, and on the way back we made a detour via the hometown of our Altar Guild leader Annette Rowles, Philadelphia.

The theme of the conference this year was "White Privilege." We explored both theoretically and practically how the legacy of colonialism continues to shape our society today and what churches can do to participate in the process of coming to terms and reconciliation. Particularly memorable for me is the tour of the historical monuments in the center of the city, which tell a lot about the changing history of this country: The Lincoln Memorial, in front of which Martin Luther King Jr. delivered his world-famous "I Have a Dream" speech, and the large statue further down the waterfront dedicated to him and the civil rights movement. I was also impressed by the new African American Museum, which shed light on aspects of the culture and history that were previously unknown to me.



In addition, the exchange with colleagues, whom I now know a little better, was enriching and strengthening. Unfortunately, we had to say goodbye to the pastor from Costa Rica and the pastor's family from Chile, as they will be returning to Germany in the fall. I am grateful for the broadening of horizons, the many impulses and valuable conversations that I was able to have. I would also like to sincerely thank all the volunteers and my assistant Marlena Müller, who more than worthily represented me in my absence and carried the parish work with a high degree of professionalism and a lot of heart and soul.
